

In August, The Philadelphia Orchestra Association formally recognized the exemplary contributions of our musicians and staff. Principal Bassoon **Daniel Matsukawa** was presented with the 2021 C. Hartman Kuhn Award, given annually to “the member of The Philadelphia Orchestra who has shown ability and enterprise of such character as to enhance the standards and the reputation of the ensemble.” Retirees **Michael Shahan** (bass) and **Jeffry Kirschen** (horn) were honored for a remarkable 57 and 32 years of dedicated service, respectively. **Alex Veltman** (cello) and **Arthur Curtis** (managing director, information technology) were each recognized for their 25 years of service. We are deeply grateful to each of these extraordinary individuals for their commitment to the Orchestra—congratulations and best wishes!



The Orchestra is honored to welcome **Charlotte Blake Alston** to our official roster of artistic collaborators as The Philadelphia Orchestra's storyteller, narrator, and host. Charlotte made her Philadelphia Orchestra debut nearly 30 years ago and has appeared as host and narrator of our School and Family concerts since 1991. She is currently in her 28th season as host of Sound All Around, the Orchestra's preschool concert series, and has also appeared on each of the Orchestra's Martin Luther King, Jr., Tribute Concerts since 2003.



We are delighted to announce that Conducting Fellow **Lina Gonzalez-Granados** has been named resident conductor of the Los Angeles Opera through the 2024–25 season. We have been fortunate enough to experience Lina's talents firsthand and know that she will bring extraordinary gifts to this new role.



The Philadelphia Orchestra extends heartfelt and well-deserved congratulations to our principal guest conductor, Nathalie Stutzmann, on her historic appointment as music director of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, beginning in the 2022–23 season. She is only the second woman to hold a music director position with a major American orchestra. Nathalie will maintain her role as principal guest conductor here in Philadelphia, and we look forward to exploring her remarkable musicianship throughout the course of her three-year appointment with us. This December, she will lead three performances with the Orchestra in Verizon Hall, including Missy Mazzoli's *Sinfonia (for Orbiting Spheres)* and Schubert's Symphony No. 9 (“Great”).



In July, the Philadelphia Orchestra Global Music Center launched with a one-week online intensive pilot for students in China. In 1973, the Philadelphians were the first American orchestra to perform in the People's Republic of China, and this pilot program continues a four-decade tradition of innovation and friendship with young people throughout China. This new music education program provides high school and conservatory students with premium instrument instruction, real life performance preparation, career guidance, and a curriculum that bridges cultural differences through music education via live online instruction.

Music Education Continues this Season—in Classrooms and Online

Summer 2021 saw the return of in-person music education, with a family-friendly Sound All Around concert at the Bravo! Vail Music Festival in Vail, Colorado, and a Play!N session during the Orchestra's August residency at the Saratoga Performing Arts Center in Saratoga Springs, New York.

Here in Philadelphia, the Orchestra also returned for its third summer as the lead partner for the Mann Center for the Performing Arts' All City Orchestra Summer Academy (ACOSA). This year, 80 students in grades 6–12 had the opportunity to gain high-quality orchestra training experience through master classes with Philadelphia Orchestra musicians, chamber music rehearsals and performance opportunities, composition lessons, and electives from ACOSA partner organizations.

2021-2022 Virtual School Concert Experience

Just in time for back-to-school in September, the Orchestra launched a Virtual School Concert Experience, including a brand-new curriculum with videos and resources for teachers. The capstone of the experience will be a School Concert to be released in March, inviting students and teachers to attend a digital concert performance created especially for them.



Hosted by Charlotte Blake Alston, the Orchestra's storyteller, narrator, and host, our popular Sound All Around performances continue online this fall, with two episodes for young listeners ages 3–5.



Our City, Your Orchestra and the HearTOGETHER Podcast Are Back

Our City, Your Orchestra returns for a second season! This series of free online concerts performed by small ensembles at Black-owned businesses, non-profit institutions, and iconic cultural locations throughout the Philadelphia region continues this fall with new collaborations with Asian Arts Initiative and Grant Blvd.

Located in Philadelphia's Chinatown North, Asian Arts Initiative is a multidisciplinary arts center offering exhibitions, performances, artist residencies, youth workshops, and a community gathering space. Grant Blvd is an ethically sourced, sustainable clothing store in West Philadelphia that uses upcycled garments, fabrics, and vintage fashion to create employment opportunities and raise awareness for marginalized communities.

The Philadelphia Orchestra's recording of Florence Price's Symphonies Nos. 1 and 3, led by Yannick Nézet-Séguin, was released digitally by the Deutsche Grammophon label in September, launching a planned series of recordings celebrating Price's work. This remarkable recording is now available to stream on major platforms, with a CD release scheduled for January 2022.

In August, Philadelphia Orchestra President and CEO Matías Tarnopolsky joined with arts and civic leaders on the steps of the Academy of Music to mark the future location of a statue commissioned in honor of famed contralto Marian Anderson. Born and raised in Philadelphia, Anderson was the first Black person to become a member of the Metropolitan Opera. Denied access to perform at Constitution Hall in Washington, D.C., in 1939 because of her race, she went on to make history at a famous performance for an audience of 75,000 at the Lincoln Memorial. The statue of Anderson will also have historic status as the first monument to a Black woman in the city of Philadelphia. Plans for the installation of the statue are underway; final candidates for the design of the statue are scheduled to be announced in February 2022 to mark the 125th anniversary of Anderson's birth.

Built in 1857, the Academy of Music is a fitting location to honor Anderson's artistic legacy. The historic home of The Philadelphia Orchestra, the Academy is the oldest opera house in the United States still used for its original purpose and is owned and maintained by The Philadelphia Orchestra and Kimmel Center, Inc.
